NEW DAY FOR MONTHLY MEETING

The Mahncke Park Neighborhood Association (MPNA) will hold its monthly meetings on the third Tuesday of the month beginning in June. Meetings will continue to start at 7pm and be held in Lion's Field Center, 2809 Broadway.

A SUMMER KICK OFF

On Friday, June 10 all Mahncke Park residents are invited to gather at the Pig Pen, 106 Pershing Avenue from 6-9pm. This kid-friendly get together is supported in part by a donation from PHL Foundation, allowing us to "take over" Pig Pen for our summer celebration.

BRACKENRIDGE PARK, CHAPTER 1, TREES

The San Antonio Parks Dept. provided information at a May 24 public meeting further clarifying plans to rehabilitate a portion of Brackenridge Park along the river near the zoo and the 1870 pump house. In response to concerns expressed at an April 24 public meeting regarding the plan's proposal to remove 105 trees and to potentially destroy a traditional heron & egret nesting area, four local professional arborists were engaged to assess the plan. The arborists recommended one 8" diameter pecan and one 44" live oak on the removal list be saved (they also advised that two large crepe myrtles be added to the removal list). In addition, tree moving experts reviewed the tree removal list and identified trees they felt could be successfully relocated. At issue is balancing the obligation to preserve historic rock walls alongside the river while being responsive to the public's interest in preserving the park's trees without negatively impacting flood water conveyance.

The SA River Authority has initiated a hydrology study which will assess the option of repositioning the rock walls toward a goal of limiting tree removal. Study results are expected to be presented at this month's follow-up public meeting.

The public meeting will be held in the Witte Museum's Prassel Auditorium on June 14 beginning at 6pm.

JULY 4TH PARADE AND FIREWORKS

The MPNA is reviving a Mahncke Park tradition and giving it a new twist - the 4th of July Parade! Gather in Mahncke Park across from Lamar Elementary at 9:30am on Monday, July 4. All people-powered floats encouraged - wagons, bikes, trikes, and walking. Children, pets, and well-behaved adults are welcome.

Later, fireworks!

The SA Country Club has scheduled their fireworks show to occur shortly after sunset on Monday, July 4.

BRACKENRIDGE PARK, CHAPTER 2, GOATS

Observant neighbors were delighted by the 160 goats nibbling overgrown vegetation in Brackenridge Park last month. Rent-A-Ruminant Texas was hired to clear invasive plants and raise sightlines within a seven acre portion of the park – generally SW of the Witte Museum parking garage. Owners Carolyn & Kyle Carr report their goats provide an eco-friendly, effective, and sustainable solution to vegetation management. The Carrs and their goats arrived in mid-May after completing a job in Houston and expecting to be here for a couple weeks; however, Ms. Carr said the goats loved Brackenridge Park – literally. They cleared an acre a day – faster than they had ever eaten before. They departed after a week to rejoin the 90 goats at their farm in Brownwood.

The Carrs' goats are one to nine years old and a variety of breeds, including Nubian, Boer, Spanish, Nigerian Dwarf, Savannah, Pygmy, Kiko and others. All their goats are adopted. Some were raised as pets, others were FFA projects, 65 were rescued from Florida after Hurricane Michael, and others they adopted from animal shelters. Every animal has a name which is on its ear tag. The 160 goat "travel team" consists of fixed males and intact females. The goats that don't travel are billy goats, mothers & babies, and blind or retired goats. The Carrs have a "no slaughter" policy.

YOUR TAX \$\$\$ AT WORK, PART 2,102,077,273

SAPD Officer Juan Hernandez attended last month's MPNA meeting and stated there were no major instances in our neighborhood to report. Family disturbance calls and vehicle burglary mostly. Regarding the latter, Officer Hernandez encouraged that all car doors be locked and all valuables inside your car be kept out of sight. Most frequently, vehicle burglaries are a crime of opportunity and begin with bad people checking vehicle door handles.

Earlier this year, area residents expressed concerns about a particular driver behaving irresponsibly near the intersections of Milton Street and Claremont Avenue & Natalen Street. A neighbor provided irrefutable proof to Officer Hernandez, who then contacted the person leasing the vehicle. Following Hernandez' discussion with the lessee and the lessee's misbehaving offspring, no poor driving has been reported. We appreciate Officer Hernandez' responsiveness and effectiveness, and we thank him for attending the MPNA's monthly meetings.

BRACKENRIDGE PARK, CHAPTER 3, TURF WAR

A turf war of sorts has erupted in conjunction with the city's plan to realign city council district boundaries. Following completion of the US census every 10 years, an effort is initiated to balance an equal population among each of the 10 city council districts. This year, a redistricting advisory committee composed of citizens (not of city council members – although multiple former city council members are on the committee) recommended placing all of Brackenridge Park in District 1 – for the last 10 years part of Brackenridge Park has been in our District 2 and part in District 1. And for the 10 years prior, Brackenridge Park was completely in our city council district.

As reported at last month's MPNA meeting by Mr. Frankie Trynoski, Chief of Staff to our District 2 City Councilman Jalen McKee-Rodriguez, the Councilman prefers Brackenridge Park remain "as is" in both Districts 1 and 2. However, as reported by San Antonio's daily newspaper, energetic efforts by District 1 residents in the River Road Neighborhood seem to have swayed the advisory committee. City Council is expected to vote on the issue this month; Mayor Nirenberg has asked City Council for a yes or no vote without making changes "to build trust and signal that the committee's decisions should be free from the influence of elected officials."
